

TOB-60N Convection Toaster Oven Broiler-mp4 (072-09-0376) TCIN#1823

MARY RODGERS: Hi, I'm Mary Rodgers, and this is the Cuisinart Convection Toaster Oven Broiler.

Mary places her hand over the top of the toaster oven to show various design aspects. She points out different parts of the toaster oven.

MARY RODGERS: It has a beautiful industrial-style design, all stainless steel housing, also front panel and door. The knobs are black with--with the stainless accents. So this would really be a nice companion to any of your stainless steel large appliances that you might have--also has a nice, wide bar handle, also looks much more industrial.

A close-up reveals the front of the Convection Toaster Oven Broiler. Mary points to three knobs on the right side of the toaster oven.

MARY RODGERS: And then, the knobs here are what control your oven.

Mary twists the top knob in the stack of three.

MARY RODGERS: First of all, this is your temperature control, so you just turn it from one side to the other, pick your temperature. It goes all the way up to "broil" and also the "toast" function.

Mary turns the toaster oven's middle knob.

MARY RODGERS: Here is your functionality knob. This is basically "warm," "broil." When you turn it--"bake," "toast," and "convection."

Mary turns the bottom shade indicator. The toaster oven turns on and begins ticking.

MARY RODGERS: This is your shade control. You just turn this, and on the bottom, it'll have your shade indicator. That'll shut off.

Mary cranks the bottom knob to turn it off. The toaster oven dings. She continues to speak about the functions and points at the various knobs.

Mary turns the bottom knob the opposite way to turn the toaster oven on. The light glows orange, and she points to it. She then turns the bottom knob back to the "off" position as the toaster oven dings.

MARY RODGERS: I'm gonna turn it back to the "off" position. When you're using any function, except for "toast," you're gonna turn this knob the other way to the "on." And you'll notice the light will light that way.

Mary places a hand on the toaster oven's side.

MARY RODGERS: The other thing that's really nice about this oven is that it's .6 cubic feet.

Mary opens the toaster oven and pulls out the baking and broiling racks to reveal the space inside the toaster oven.

MARY RODGERS: I'm gonna open it up, so you can see how generous in size it is. This is also your baking and broiling rack.

Mary pulls out the baking tray and broiling rack and holds them to the side. She places her hand on the baking tray and then sets the broiling rack inside the tray.

MARY RODGERS: This is the one that you use for baking, and when you're gonna broil, you just put this rack in, and it elevates your food off the bottom of the tray, so that you get nice broiling.

Mary pulls another rack out of the toaster oven.

MARY RODGERS: This rack can be used in multiple positions, so check the IB for what you should be using it for, depending on what you're baking, broiling, or toasting.

Mary pulls a metal tray out of the bottom of the toaster oven and then slides it back in.

MARY RODGERS: This is your removable crumb tray. Take it out every once in awhile and make sure you keep it clean. That's really important.

Mary closes the toaster oven's door.

MARY RODGERS: The other thing that you should know about the broiling function is, there's an automatic stop on the door--keeps it open about an inch.

Mary places her fingers on the opening of the door of the toaster oven.

MARY RODGERS: The other thing is that that's meant to help air circulate around the oven.

Mary gestures with her hand to explain the air circulation of the oven.

MARY RODGERS: So there you have it. The .6-cubic-foot Convection Toaster Oven Broiler by Cuisinart.
